Curate Andy Medlicott Reflects on the importance of kindness and goodness

It is a Friday morning. Here I am, a Christian minister wearing a dogcollar, being helped by a Sikh gentleman, in a community hub run by volunteers, supported by The Lions Club with help from companies such as Centrica and Gregs, looking for sandwiches for a muslim couple who are asylum seekers whom I have brought. Google Translate comes in handy as I speak no Arabic, and their English is limited!

What a mix of people! All mucking in with a desire to help. I see God working through all these people. We leave with some warm clothes, bedding and essentials... but equally important; everyone treats them with dignity and respect.

That morning driving to meet them to take them to the hub I was praying, "Lord, please help me, I feel so unable to help." I can act as a taxi service, offer a smile and a kind face... and perhaps offer to get some food... it doesn't feel like much compared to what I imagine they have gone through. They did not choose to leave their home. But I don't need to do this alone. My prayer was answered through the kindness and generosity of others. This is God working, through all people, not bound by the walls of church buildings or theological ideals. The God who is creator and sustainer of all we see, and all that we don't see.

For me this is a perfect antidote to the doom and gloom of the daily news... there is kindness and goodness around - all we have to do is look. Knowing kindness and goodness is already present can encourage each one of us to also do acts of kindness and goodness.

So a shout out to everyone involved. Those who helped me by suggesting where we could find help. Those volunteering at, donating to, and organising, The Windsor Homeless Project. And to the church community which helps me to be available to help in the ways I can.

An Update from The Friends of St Michael's, Bray

The Friends have been involved in three events over the last few months. We are very grateful to all those who supported us by either coming along, donating, contributing, joining in, helping and buying.

The first was the Summer Teas which raised £129. Home-made cakes and scones continue to go down well and we were pleased to welcome friends, old and new.

The return of Bray Village Fête, after a gap of ten years, lived up to everything that the organisers hoped for; a delightful community event held on the Village Green, run by local people, for the local people. One of their aims was to allow Bray charities to promote themselves and raise funds. The Friends ran a stall selling second hand books and jigsaw puzzles, along with our newly designed tea towel, cards and other Bray memorabilia. The weather stayed dry and warm, much to everyone's amazement and we were delighted to raise £529.63.

Finally, we held our second talk in the church at the beginning of October with guest speaker Hugo Vickers. The title of his presentation was "Q2 to K3" – a slightly enigmatic title referring to the transition from Queen Elizabeth II to King Charles III. His easy style and humour combined with his knowledge of the royal family over many decades, reminded us what an amazing lady the late queen was. Two messages remained with me. Duty and service to the country was apparent throughout her reign and brought her much happiness along with her belief that you couldn't change the past but maybe you could influence the future for the better. Those present thoroughly enjoyed the talk and the refreshments afterwards. We raised £658.50.
